Elections: The Council will be holding its election at the March membership meeting. Nominations will be accepted from the floor. Ernie Rodriquez will serve as the elections official. The Greater Quad Cites Hispanic Chamber of Commerce ambassadors will be on hand for the ceremony. Additionally we will be having a potluck dinner afterwards, so please bring a dish to share. The Council will be furnishing the meat from El Mariachi Restaurant.

Membership: Tim Garcia (membership chairmen) will be submitting our annual recharter application with approximately 146 members on its official 2014 roster. We would like to commend Tim for all his hard work this year on the re-charter application and the membership renewal. Thank you.

2014 Scholarships: The window is open, and closes 3/31/14. The Council will be awarding \$15,000 again this year. We are waiting for responses from local colleges to confirm if they will match again, Augustana, St. Ambrose, EICC and Black Hawk College. WIU Quad Cities has already confirmed they will match again this year. Also WIU is hosting a scholarship partnership event to raise funds to help provide scholarship match to area minority organizations. The event will be held in April, more info will be provided at the next membership meeting. The scholarship committee will meet in early April to rank applications and make selections. All area schools have received the information re: our scholarship program.

Education Committee: Please take time to read to your children. Statistics have proven that quality reading time improves your child's overall performance at school.

The DCSD is currently involved in changing the start time for its high schools to as much as an hour later in the morning. Studies show that high school age children are simply not wired to function "early" in the morning – a fact most parents of teenagers already know. Discussions continue as to how such an adjustment will affect other aspects of the school day.

There is still much work to be done by the Drop-out Prevention Task Force and Council 10 will proudly continue to contribute to its success any way we can.

Legislative Day: Representatives from Council 10 attended this year's Legislative Day at the State Capital in Des Moines. Joe Henry & Tim Garcia and other area Hispanic community representatives met with the Governor and the LT Governor Kim Reynolds to discuss state issues that are important to our community (see below). Thank you Tim for being our Council representative and for the long day you put in.

Elementary Schools Music Program: LULAC Council 10 continues its partnership with the Davenport School District. Due to the district's current budget constraints we are now accepting donations to help fund repairs to 28 string instruments (violins and cellos) that will be used in four elementary schools in the Davenport Community Schools. These schools currently have waiting lists of students who would like to learn to play an instrument. Some of these students will not have the opportunity to pursue

their interest in music unless instruments in good working order can be provided. Many of these students are at risk or minority students.

An article published in Psychology Today, November 13, 2013 summarized neuroscientists' findings of the benefits derived from learning to play an instrument. Musical training has been shown to increase brain volume and strengthen communication between areas of the brain.

Learning to play an instrument also offers important lessons in discipline and focus, as well as instilling a life-long appreciation for music.

Bracero Exhibit at the Putnam Museum: Bittersweet Harvest", a bilingual (English/Spanish) exhibition on loan from the Smithsonian, explores the little-known story of the Bracero program; the largest guest worker program in U.S history. Between 1942 and 1964, millions of Mexican men came to the United States on short-term labor contracts. Both bitter and sweet, the Bracero experience tells a story of exploitation but also of opportunity. This exhibition is organized into three main sections that explore the braceros' motivations and expectations for the journey north, the work they did and the effects the Bracero program had on family and communities in Mexico and the United States. "Bittersweet Harvest" features the work of famed photojournalist Leonard Nadel as well as oral histories collected by the Bracero Oral History Project. There is still time to visit the exhibit. The Exhibit with be open through May 18th of this year.

Iowa LULAC hosts second annual Latino Legislative Day

DES MOINES - The second annual Latino Legislative Day drew about 25 legislators and dozens of Latinos from central and eastern lowa.

The League of United Latin American Citizens of Iowa hosted the event today at the Iowa State Capitol. The day was created to give Latinos an opportunity to meet with their legislators, to develop relationships with elected leaders, and to address various concerns and legislation.

A handful of speakers provided those who attended with information about consumer protection laws, bills before the Iowa Legislature that affect the Latino community, and an update on efforts to reach out to elected leaders. Attendees then met with legislators to discuss various bills and the legislator's position.

"We were very pleased with the reception we received from legislators and hope that they take our concerns seriously when the time comes to vote on bills that affect the daily lives of working Latino families," said Joe Enriquez Henry, the state director of Iowa LULAC.

LULAC worked with the American Civil Liberties Union of Iowa and Iowa Citizens for Community Improvement to meet with legislators and discuss legislation designed to improve access to and affordability of health care; to increase funding for education, specifically for programs to assist students who are not native English speakers and come from low-income families; to provide driver's licenses to immigrants; and to increase the state's minimum wage.

"We are citizens, and we are entitled to every privilege of any other citizen in this country," said Mary E. Campos, a longtime Latino community advocate and state LULAC officer.

State LULAC leaders also met privately with Gov. Terry Branstad and Lt. Gov. Kim Reynolds and discussed efforts to improve education in Iowa and access to technology for Latino students.
